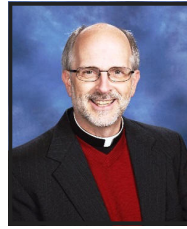

Ken's Kaleidoscope

April 29, 2018



The Bishop's Annual Appeal is our opportunity as Christian stewards to show our gratitude for all God's gifts and to do what God has asked us to do—reinvest a small portion of our blessings in order to extend the Reign of God and continue the work of Jesus Christ.

When you give to the Bishop's Annual Appeal, you make possible the more than 70 spiritual, pastoral, educational, and charitable programs and services provided through the diocese. Your gift does make a difference: Our parish goals are 100% participation and \$270,000, and your gift will help us attain both goals. Make your commitment as a part of your Easter celebration — Jesus was crucified and raised from the dead for our sake; how can you show your gratitude? You might even consider increasing your last year's gift by a percentage or specific dollar amount in order to meet increased needs in our diocese and beyond.

Parish Vision—Last week I wrote about our parish vision, prepared by parish leaders to provide a sense of direction for our parish. A vision statement gives our parish as a whole a common direction, to know where we're headed. Having a vision helps to guide our decision-making – to choose what we'll do and not do, because we can't do everything. Having a parish vision helps us to focus our priorities so we can use our resources well.

Our vision has one key word, and four bullet points. The first bullet point is **Love God**. When Jesus was asked, "What is the most important commandment?" this was his answer: Love God! God has loved us first; then God created us and gave us all the rest of the universe as a gift. God then extended himself again when we got lost and forgot who we were and chose sin instead. After all that, God asks one thing in return: Love me back! If we are created in the image and likeness of God, then the best way to know ourselves is to love the One in whose image we're made. We get to know God well by remembering what God has done, listening to what God teaches, and acting like God acts.

Our primary action for loving God is to pray together, which is why we have the Eucharist. Remembering that God is a Trinity, its own community of loving one another, we come together in the image of that Trinity to be united with one another in love. So the first bullet point of our parish is this: we Love God.

We do that first of all in our Sunday worship as a community. We strive to do that as best as we can – heartfelt praise, proclaiming the Scriptures well, singing out our hearts led by good music, in a beautiful space, with good preaching, and ministering to one another in various roles of readers, singers and musicians, ministers of Holy Communion, altar servers, sacristans, priests and deacons.

There are more who make us welcome and cared for when we come -- ushers and greeters, wedding assistants, people who welcome newcomers to the parish, those who make donuts and coffee, and those who clean up after we leave. There are those who keep praying for the needs of our parish and our world – at daily mass, the Rosary group, the prayer groups, and the Prayer Line.

It also includes all those who take care of our church and grounds – those who decorate the church, and those who care for the plants, the candles, the liturgical linens and vestments, the gardens and lawns and parking lots, and the maintenance and janitorial staff. *(Continued on Page 3)*

Kingly Office of Our Baptism—The late Archbishop Dom Hélder Câmara of Brazil is well known for saying, "When I encourage us to feed the hungry, they call me a Christian. When I ask 'why are there hungry people?' they call me a communist." He offers a distinction in feeding hungry people versus looking at the root causes of why much of our world and nation live in hunger, poverty, and oppression. If we help feed people for a day, they will be hungry tomorrow. If we walk with hungry, poor people helping them feed and better themselves, developing their God-given gifts, we are working to build the just Reign of God and working for justice.

By the royal office, the kingly/queenly office, of our baptism, we are called to address the root causes of injustice in our world. Most injustices in society are systemic and have been festering for decades. Charity and service play important roles in the Christian life, but fail to address the root causes of injustice. By our putting on the person of Jesus Christ in baptism, we are called to live as Christ in our communities, working with others to address the root causes of racism, sexism, poverty and other injustices. We cannot do everything, but we can work for justice by getting to know Christ in one person, and through that relationship, come to love the suffering Christ in that person. Through this love, our baptismal grace can motivate us to work for the liberation of the suffering Christ in others who suffer from these societal injustices, what St. John Paul II calls "social sin."

From *Lumen Gentium*, a document of the Second Vatican Council, we hear, "...let the [baptized] so remedy the institutions and conditions of the world...that these may be conformed to the norms of justice...that in every...affair they are to be guided by a Christian conscience, since no human activity may be withdrawn from God's dominion."

Approximately 1500 years ago, St. Augustine, our diocesan patron, strongly advocated for the poor and oppressed. Amidst a dispute between landowners and day laborers, Augustine challenged the landowners about the low wages they paid their workers. In response to Augustine's charge, the landowners gave their workers a one-time, charitable gift, hoping this would bring resolution. Accordingly, Augustine responded with a stronger call for them to embrace conversion and justice, saying, "Charity is no substitute for justice withheld."

By putting on Christ in baptism, may we build the just Reign of God by getting to know and advocating for the suffering Christ in the poor and marginalized.
